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



The Foundation vision is *a community that offers opportunity for everyone with the desire to succeed*, and our Development Committee worked throughout the year to share their passion for the organization. We've celebrated several milestones this year: our 15th golf outing, ten years of WoW and the 50th Anniversary of Work Skills Corporation. Our reach continues to expand. Unlocking the Power of Communication

When Emily initially joined our Speech and Language Program, her communication abilities were limited to just a handful of functional words, and maintaining her attention on a single task for more than a minute or two was a challenge.

To address these difficulties, an individualized and rigorous speech therapy regimen was established; Emily attended sessions four times a week.

The transformation has been nothing short of outstanding. Emily's vocabulary has expanded rapidly, enabling her to mimic new words as well as utilize them effectively and appropriately in various contexts.

She can now construct two-to-three-word phrases, allowing her to express her thoughts, make requests, and engage in conversations. Beyond her language development, Emily's play skills have made significant progress. She can now independently and cooperatively participate in structured play activities with her peers.

Emily's journey exemplifies the profound impact of our Speech and Language Program and demonstrates that focused and intensive interventions can revolutionize someone's ability to communicate and interact socially. How empowering!

The Foundation was pleased to provide financial support to the re-launch of this program in 2023.

WSC's Award-Winning Creative Haven

The other WSC program selected to receive funding from the Foundation in 2023 was Artisan Corner.

Artisan Corner began over 13 years ago as a modest internal program and has grown into a robust platform for training, development, and retail. A creative haven for individuals with disabilities, it provides opportunities for them to make, market and earn income from their original art pieces. It also gives them a sense of community. Artisans participate in person or virtually.

Each artist is given the freedom to explore various mediums and discover what resonates with them. This has led to a wide range of beautiful creations, including paintings, fiber arts, ceramics, jewelry, and more. We are incredibly proud of them, and it is very rewarding to watch their confidence and skills grow.

More than 150 WSC clients have participated in the Artisan Corner program – 58 this year alone! To accommodate the growth, a new art center was created at WSC in the fall. They now have twice the space and lots of storage. We look forward to seeing all the wonderful new things that come out of "the corner" now that they have more room!

Our artisans have pushed creative boundaries, inspired and delighted new audiences, and received well-deserved accolades and recognition for their talents. Several original pieces were featured on tour this year; Zach's Starry Night Crossover traveled through four states. Other works were on display at Hartland's ArtWalk, the Cultura Celebration in Howell and at Source America in Anaheim California.

Finished Artisan Corner pieces are available at the boutique, which is located inside our corporate offices in Brighton. You'll also find a huge assortment of things with beautiful artisan images sublimated on them. Items are also available online in our Etsy shop: **@ArtisanCornerWSC**

Again this year, we hosted PopUp shops at various businesses and events. Artisans earn income when something they made is sold, and we are happy to help them get bigger paychecks.

It was 1973 when a group of parents came together to form Work Skills Corporation (WSC), driven by concern for the limited vocational support available to their children with diverse needs and abilities.

Upon completing high school, these young people faced a daunting void with no avenues for job training or employment.

Five years later, Rod Jones joined the organization and spent the next 41 years transforming the small enterprise into a thriving venture. Jones was determined to make WSC self-sustaining, channeling his inventive spirit and unwavering energy into achieving that goal. The grassroots collective of concerned parents gradually evolved into a full-fledged business operation, a testament to Jones' indomitable spirit and resourcefulness.



Over half a century since its inception, WSC has grown, reflecting the vision of the founders and the commitment of those who have nurtured its mission through the years. The organization has expanded to address unmet community needs and now has eight divisions under its umbrella of services, providing programs that support learning, working, and living.

The mission has always been to pioneer innovative opportunities for participants to engage in meaningful work, paving the way for them to secure competitive employment in the community.

As we celebrate five decades of unwavering dedication, it's clear that WSC's impact extends far beyond its original vision of providing employment and training services to people with disabilities. This remarkable journey stands as a testament to creating a more inclusive and equitable society, to the benefit of the underserved and the community.

Mia embarked on a journey in November 2022 with a clear goal in mind: to graduate high school and equip herself with the tools necessary to navigate the world confidently.


